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Advantages of patients on the ward

- Patients are well placed for the consent process. There is ample opportunity to speak to the patient several times and ensure they are happy with being in the trial.
- Patients may experience a quicker and easier process through the screening tests as they can be done as and when there is a free slot.
- Good opportunity to get other doctors involved in the trial. They will know which patients are on the wards and be better able to advise if a patient might be suitable.



FAQs

Advice from Manchester

Q. What is the best way to approach patients found on the wards?

A. Arrange for them to be seen by both the PI and the research nurse at a suitable time. You should ensure that this does not confuse the patient into thinking the trial is part of their standard care. Patients on the wards are ideally placed to be eased into the trial with regular contact from trial personnel.

As Manchester Royal Infirmary are the site best using wards as a patient identification source, they have provided a little advice on their process.

This is one of the routine ways to screen for patients at Manchester, for all trials not only for REVIVED.

When first identified as being a potential patient, they are put on the tracking log and followed through the process. So far we have encountered no challenges with this source.

Thanks to Thabitha Charles (research nurse) for this insight into their screening techniques.
